❖ **Self Sustainable and Development Programme for Poor Elderly in the Slums of Mumbai**

In the year 2007 - 2008, SHED has conducted various supportive activities for the Grannies like providing free rationing, sarees, arranging Laughter classes, continuation of canteen, formation of SHGs.

SHED celebrated Republic Day on 26th Jan 08; The National Flag was hoisted by one of our senior citizens, Saraswati Amma. After the flag hoisting all those present sang a song in chorus. Cultural songs were sung along with dances which were performed. This programme was followed by serving refreshments.

SHED serves the slum dwellers in the Dharavi area where people from different states and belonging to varied religions and castes have been living close to each other. Therefore, in order to develop communal Harmony SHED celebrates various festivals and important Days with people of all communities and faiths.

Haldi Kumkum is one of the traditional religious ceremonies of the Hindus. All the women and the older people actively participated in this Programme, along with their children and grandchildren. Various cultural programmes were performed by the grandchildren of these older people. The older people also actively participated in this by helping in the serving of d refreshments. The whole programme was full of fun and was enjoyed by all. The older people were also made aware of the Police Helpline. They were told that in case of any emergency they can dial 193 for the help from Police.

SHED organized an Eye Check - up camp in the month of February 08 in co-ordination with HELPAGE INDIA & the LAXMI EYE HOSPITAL. A total of 85 senior citizens were benefited from it. 6 of the senior citizens were referred to the Mahatma Gandhi Eye Hospital for cataract operations, and 14 were referred to the Laxmi Eye Hospital. Mr. Vaidhyanathan of Laxmi Eye Hospital was kind enough to send their vehicle to take them to the hospital.

In the month of June 08 the Senior Citizens Association of "F" ward organized a workshop on the Networking concept. This workshop was highly beneficial to all the networking NGO's & Associations. It gave us better direction and vision for achieving our future goals. The resource persons for this workshop were Dr. Lata Narayanan, a Faculty member of TISSS, and her team member from M ward. She also shared her experiences at M ward in respect of the networking concept.

Total 111 cases were dealt during 2007-2008. Most of the cases were of harassments by Husband /in-laws and demand for dowry. Legal Aid through Family Court and Police Assistance is availed in cases, where there is difference of between parties concerned.

VOCATIONAL TRAINING / INCOME GENERATION

This is an important component of our Empowerment of women programme. Since 1983 we had trained **50,592** women/girl from our training in various disciplines. The classes are conducted to provide a means to women/girls to earn a living, supplement family income and to be economically secure during the of crisis. EDUCATION

Keeping in view that Pre-School education has a very important role in creating a strong foundation for learning; we have organized many Balwadis Programmes for children between 3 to 5 years.

During this year, we had established a new English medium Balwadi for the 54 slums children's of Kalina for improving /providing Education, Health Care & changing Outlook of Slum Children. We had also started the Sr.Kg class of 25 children at Saphale.

The prime thrust of the balwadies. It is equally important to encourage them to be in the mainstream of the social milieu. Therefore generating awareness, organizing them into groups and providing them exposure to enable them to evolve is sought through the programme.

The curriculum to impart holistic non-formal education to disadvantaged children from slums. The new method of teaching is designed in such a way that it not only strengthens their ability to read, speak and write but also inculcates in them a strong value system - so important to become responsible citizens later in life.

In our Balwadies we had provision for taking care of health and nutritional needs of children with regular health check-ups. Free mid-day meals is provided to all childrens. Recreational activities and excursions at periodic intervals to broaden the horizons of children is an important component of the programme.

Parents of the children are counselled on the need and importance of education in the life of an individual. Monthly parent teacher meetings are conducted to ensure that the parents of the children remain motivated to send their children to the Balwadies. The education programme undertakes the responsibility of mainstreaming the children into the formal system of education.

In our education programmes, we have added Culture and Values. We are giving lessons about Human Values, culture, National Integration, Gandhian Values, to all our Pre-Primary and NFE students to enable these children to be good citizen & be proud of our rich heritage and past. Prayers, Songs, Shokes, Communal Harmony, Meditation, National Pledge, Yoga, Dance / Songs / Values are a part of their daily curricular.

Our library is at Dharavi with 3000 books, these are mostly reference, general Knowledge and text books. We also have books on agriculture and vocational guidance.

Effective & Sustainable AIDS Intervention Programme for Migrant Workers of Dharavi Slum, Mumbai.

Goal of the Programme : To halt & reverse the prevalence of HIV/AIDS among the Migrant population and to provide quality services for their sexual health needs in Dharavi Slum.

Dharavi is the largest slum not only in India but also in Asia. The slum based youths in the age group of 12-15 yrs (Girls / Boys) are highly prone to HIV infection. The slums youths lacks access to education and proper living due to extreme poverty. So they start working at very early age to supplement the family income.

Youth of Dharavi are potential high risk groups as they are frequenting the sleaze joints, bars and also come in contact unorganized sex workers. Most of the girls work as a film extras, Bars dancers & as unorganized sex worker due to easy money and good things supplies. These sex workers are not attached to any brothels operates in public utility like bars, beauty and massage parlors.

REDUCING STD/STI/ HIV AMONGST BAR GIRLS & SEX WORKERS OF DHARAVI SLUMS.

SHED is working with based sex workers at Dharavi & Jogeshwari (East). SHED had registered 3940 sex workers in their respective areas. At present SHED has 2244 active sex workers population inclusive of Dharavi and Jogeshawari area. SHED is having one static clinic at Dharavi transit camp. The clinic also includes DIC (Drop in centre) and a laboratory to facilitate static clinic.

This static clinic is also having six satellite clinics at Kumbharwada, Kunchi Korve Nagar, Rajiv Gandhi Nagar, PMGP Colony, Naik Nagar & Prem Nagar . All these satellites are fixed days fixed time clinics catering to sex workers and their regular partners. SHED had organized health camps at each area to reach out to key population (KP). At jogeshwari SHED also organized health camps for clinical service.

During this year, the following activities were run with sex workers and their clients in the slum of Dharavi & Jogeshwari.

❖ CLINIC/DIC(DROP IN CENTRE) Activities :

We have one STI Clinic along with Lab facility and two part time doctors who treat STI and general ailments. Medicines are given free to all the sex workers and their regular partners. Their blood test is done i.e. RPR/VDRL, Gram staining, Blood grouping, and pregnancy test, follow- up of these patients is done with the help of our out reach staff. Sex workers who are registered come to clinic along with our peers and out reach workers.

There are some vulnerable areas from where patients do not come to our STI clinic, so we have started conducting health camps in such areas with the help of local people. For these camps our whole team doctor, nurse, counselor, lab technician and the out reach staff. In areas where there is shortage of space we conduct camps in mobile vans, which has all facilities where a doctor can examine the patients.

Dharavi is a huge area and sex workers from other end do not come to the clinic therefore to provide the services on their door step. We have established 5 satellite clinics.

Sex workers come to our DIC for stress release. They come and sit in DIC by talking to others, singing or listening to the music or watching any movie on TV. They have developed a good rapport along with our staff. We also organize different competitions for this groups e.g. rangoli, mehendi, Saree, drawing for their children, Hair style and dancing. These activities are done as per their demand.

❖ Family Development Programme (Jogeshwari)

SHED started implementing Family Development Programmes in the 2007 in deprived urban areas of Jogeshwari in harinagar, Amina Nagar, Shankarwadi, Veer bahadur Comound. . The family development method has evolved throughout the years, based on the experimentation of new innovative interventions aiming at responding to the beneficiaries' identified and expressed needs.

❖ Methodological basis of the programme. :

- Motivation to work with very deprived population and / or dysfunctional families (interest for social work and field work).
- Interpersonal / communication skills.
- Capacity to deal with stress and to keep a professional distance with the beneficiaries.
- Openness to consider and respect the beneficiaries' capacities.
- Willingness to learn new skills, a new approach and capacity to work as a team.

COMMUNITY MOBILISATION

Since the success of the whole programme is based on active community involvement, our first priority has been on mobilizing the various groups. With the help of the volunteers from the Mahila & Youth Group of the urban slums and rural areas, we have been able to organize the community under each following categories.

❖ **Mahila Group :**

These are strong women's groups with leadership development. Active participation and involvement in various activities affecting the family, community and villages. Awareness imparted about the importance of education, their lawful rights and the need for increase in literacy and motivation for saving. The result is also an increase in understanding, grasping capacity and self confidence.

One women's group is running a Canteen at our Dharavi Centre supplying clean and wholesome snacks and food to nearby school, Police Station and visitors. These groups conducted the following programme on their own:-

- Awareness about Reproductive & Child Health in the area.
- Political awareness about different candidates.
- Raksha Bandhan programme for Communal Harmony.
- Organizing Saving Bachat groups in the areas.
- Awareness about Adult Literacy among woman.

❖ **WOMEN'S DAY – 8th March 2008**

Women's Day celebrated at all centers bur in this year we had arrange a big Programme in tribal area Saphale

The various Awareness programme/games were arranged for Women / adolescent girls, Adv. Latika Baligade as given the lectures on women Rights.

These programmes were arranged to make the women aware of their rights and the forum for the redressal of their grievances, securing their rights and protection under the Law Resources person were social workers /activities with legal backgrounds and field worker.

❖ **Youth Group :**

Every Year the youth groups get together to put up Ganesh Mandals at the time of Ganesh Puja. All communities join together for this. As these youngsters have been involved with SHED in community concern, they now have a Theme for the mandals. Three years back they depicted Population control and the Small Family norm. Last year they selected AIDS Control as the theme. This year it has been Communal Harmony and AIDs prevention SHED awarded 5 prizes to the best. Mandals.

❖ **Ekta Sport Group:- 180**

We formed the EKTA youth group, a sports groups with 180 members who are from different localities. It has a managing committee. All the members took an oath to work for the development of the community, for HIV / AIDS and main objective to discourage youth from criminal activities, drug addiction and chanelise their energy to useful and constructive activities for their self and family betterment.

❖ **Cricket Tournaments**

In view of maintaining peace and communal harmony and youths should not get infected by HIV/AIDS. Cricket tournaments was arranged for the youth to encourage their sport spirit and divert their mind from destructive and illegal activities which are harmful for them as well as to the society where they live.

Cricket tournaments were arranged on 1st dec 2007. 32 team and more than 12000 audiences participated in the tournaments. The commentrators while giving community also gave message to the audience about AIDS by saying "***AIDS ki shukhala todenge apni Dharavi ko bachayenge***", Stop HIV/AIDS, Keep the promise.

Cricket Tournament was held ON BEST ground near Sion Station and SHED had achieved a great success.

❖ **GYMNASIUM.**

We had organized a meeting with the youths from Dharavi to know about the activities in which youths are interested. Many of youths suggested that we should have a Gyanasium Centre in SHED Complex.

We therefore established a Gymnasium Centre for slums youth as motivation. Gyanasium was inaugurated by Begum Bilkees latif, President SHED.

Gymnasium start from morning till evening. We have indoor games also. Total 550 youths are member of the Gymnasium.

To encourage saving and prevent exploitation by money leaders and promote self Sufficiency and food security. The monthly contributions range between Rs.10 to Rs. 25 in the tribal areas, and Rs. 50 to Rs. 100 in the slums.

Out of 5 members in each village 3 are women. They act as a village Development Council and decide on all matters concerning the village.

ENVIRONMENT

❖ **Forest Protection Committees :-**

These have been formed in villages situated near forests. They help in the restoration and re – generation of the environment, protect all existing forests and ensure planting of the trees in depleted forests.

About 12,000 new trees were planted in the catchments areas of Shilitepada by the villagers. These plants were cultivated under soil and water conservation schemes. Forest Protection committees are active in the villages bordering forests.

This programme of Hygiene, Water & Sanitation Awareness was initially started in 10 tribals villages which have perennial water problem and lack of sanitation facilities.

❖ **W.C. Blocks :-** 5 W.C.Blocks for the 5 schools have been constructed by school children. Hence Hygiene promotion among school children will be more effective as the children; from our past experiences are good learners. Earlier we had used children for conveying messages on tree protection and cleanliness with great success. We requested the Education authorities to include Hygiene Education in their curriculum.

❖ **Low cost WC Block :-** Our Model Toilet Design has been selected for replication in other areas by the Panchyati Sammitte. We have completed the following low cost toilet construction work. Most of the work has been initiated by motivating the local SHGs Groups & Women Folk who now insist on this

- ❖ **Soil and Water Conservation:** - All village wells were deepened and broadened under soil and water management scheme with the full involvement of the local Gram Panchayat – total nos of well activated are 25. This has improved drinking water supply in these villages. Earlier wells used to dry up by December. Now the supply last till March / April.

- ❖ **Environmental Sanitation :-** Environmental Sanitation or environmental health is a general term which comprises all phases of programme for improving environment and health. In the developing countries 30% of environmental hazards are caused by poor maintenance of home sanitation and its surrounding, and 75% of people are largely affected by using unsafe water and due to unhygienic living condition. Therefore, the attainment of a healthy environment is becoming more and more complex but necessary. The tribals do not have WC Blocks and use the open space for their morning ablutions. Animals also used the open spaces. The people do not have a separate shed for cattle. They are kept inside their huts, which result in lack of environmental sanitation with adverse effect on their health, especially on children.

- ❖ **Soak Pit :-** We have motivated local people and family for soak pits.

- ❖ **Compost Pit :-** To discourage women from throwing garbage in the area and to keep their village clean, SHED introduced compost making by a bio – chemical process in which micro organisms decompose organics waste matter – crop residue, kitchen waste, cow dung, urine into soil improving compost or manure. The manure is used for the Kitchen garden in each household where nutritious plants are grown. One compost unit per village is required.

Conclusion :-
